Berlin, Dec. 28.—Owing to defective means employed in heating the church of Gofrees, in upper Bavaria, 39 men and women and all the school children in the gallery were rendered unconscious by poisonous gasses during a sermon. The preacher stopped the sermon at once, but despite immediate ventilation, many other persons were taken ill as they were leaving the church.

New York, Dec. 28.—With visions of grim spectres of the dead before them and the groans of the maimed and injured ringing in their ears the men who are in control of athletics at many of the leading colleges assembled at the Murray Hill hotel today for the purpose of considering the revision of the football rules and regulations. It is hoped before the conference is over that football will be reformed to an extent that will render it at least as safe as war.

SLUM BOY CARVED OWN CAREER

Apprenticed as Seaman He now is Sheriff of Nottingham.

London Dec. 28.—Councillor Thos. Ward who has been elected sheriff of Nottingham, has had a remarkable career.

Born in the Nottingham slums 51 years ago, he was sent to the workhouse school and when 12 years of age the guardians sent him to a Southampton training ship. Twelve months later he was apprenticed on a trawler but left when he was 16 and out of the guardian's control.

Returning to Nottingham he became a pony driver in a local colliery, but owing to a strike of the miners in 1876 he was thrown out of employment. Being 19 years old and having but few friends and little money, Ward determined to try his luck in the Australian gold fields and obtained a government free passage.

He, however, returned to Nottingham after 13 months and secured a situation as porter in a large yeast factory and was later promoted to sales man. By strict attention to business he gained the firm's confidence and was subsequently admitted as a partner, becoming in time the sole proprietor.

He is now a member of the board of guardians, and two years ago was the chairman over the same institution which sent him to sea. He has been a member of the city council for the past five years. In politics he is a liberal and is extremely popular.

Young Lord Buys Aeroplane.

London, Dec. 28.—The young Duke of Westminster, who has purchased an aeroplane in which he hopes to make flights in the near future can be trusted to provide some exciting moments for his friends and relatives when he once gets aboard for he is one of the most daring young sportsmen of the present day.

He was on Lord Roberts' staff during the South African war, and he has made many journeys into the interior of Africa and America in search of big game.

As a child, the Duke of Westminster received the name of "Ben d'Or" after the late duke celebrated horse had won the Derby. To his friends he is still known by that name. Racing, however, has not taken the hold upon him that might have been expected in view of his Grosvenor blood and his immense wealth. He prefers the delights of riding his own horse to victory in a point-to-point race to the honor of winning a big race on the flat.

In the matter of the guardianship of the person and estate of David Troy, an incompetent person. Order for sale of real property.

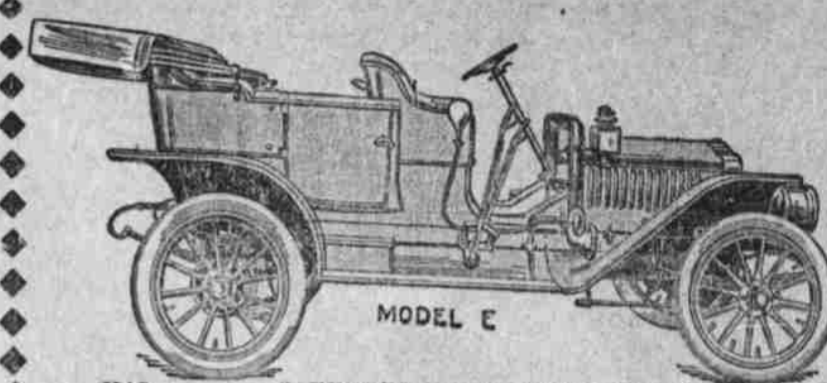

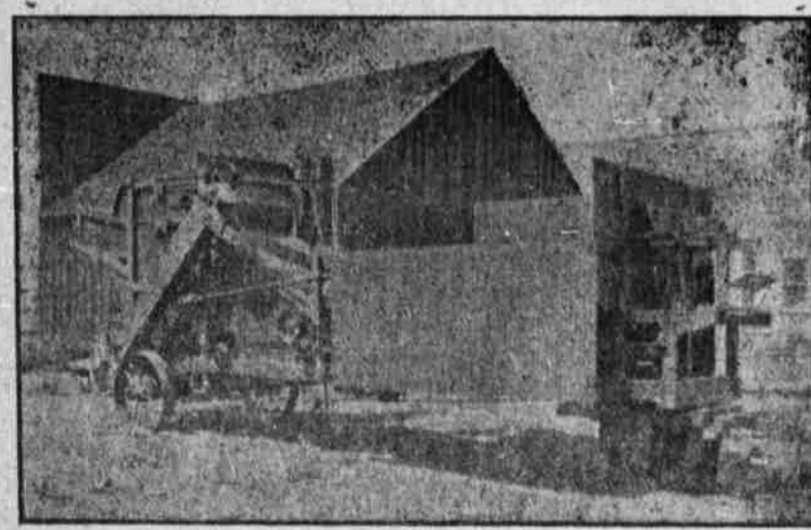
