

SUMMONS.

IRISH STORY AT STEWARD

Miss Moore is in despair, but spurns Carlton, who proceeds to hunt down her brother. He succeeds in having him captured, tried and convicted, but Squire Colton meets with many mishaps during the course of his persecution of Miss Moore. Carlton has a past and is never free from the personal interest shown him by Larry O'Connell, Bernard Daly.
