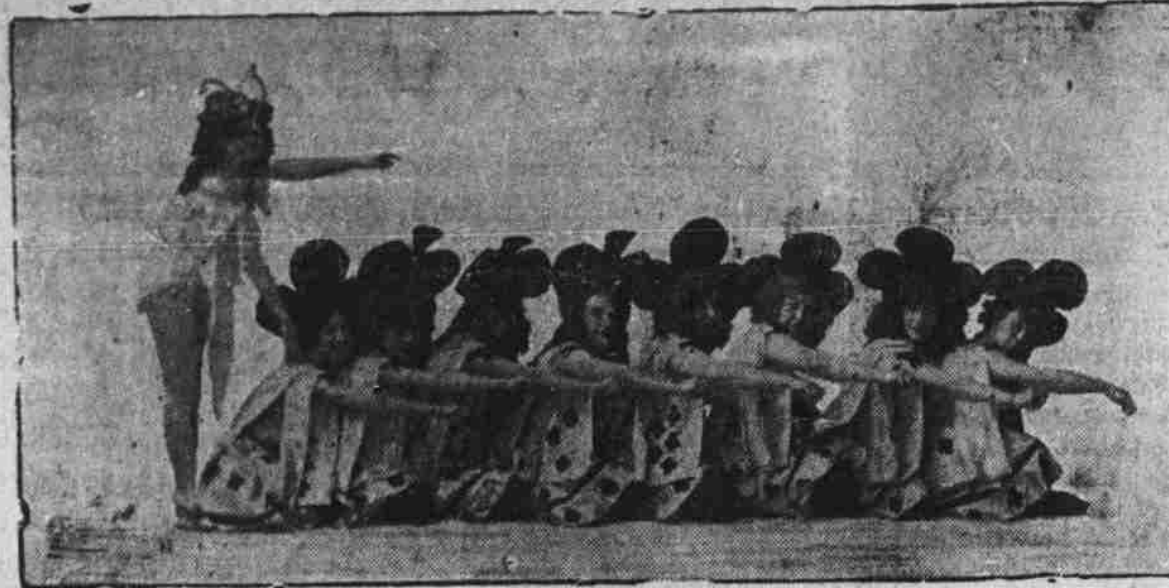

**NORTHWEST
NEWS ITEMS**

Over eighty students have taken part in the preliminary debating and oratorical contests at the Oregon Agricultural College and many more will enter before the work is completed.

The Jensen Creamery Company of Salt Lake is putting in a big creamery at Pendleton, Ore., which they expect to have in operation within a month.

There is much comment on Friday's big debate between the Universities of Utah and Oregon, and the interest is keen at the outcome of the talkfeast. Oregon's men, Collier and Spencer, are putting the final touches on their arguments, which cover a vast amount of material and represent weeks of hard work on the subject of "Resolved That All Corporations Engaged in Interstate Commerce Should be Obligated to Take Out a Federal Charter." The team has the matter well in hand and students at the University expect their duo to win. Utah is at the disadvantage for having to travel so far, and their men will probably not be in as good con-

dition as would seem necessary. Oregon has found this a disadvantage in the past.

The Lewiston-Clarkston people do not propose for Jack Frost to have the say regarding a fruit crop in that section of Idaho. The business men of these two enterprising cities have united in providing a sum of \$5000 and have ordered a carload of oil burners to be distributed among the orchardists of the country who will refund the money paid out by the business men. This system for frost fighting has been successfully practiced in Colirado for some time.
