ASKING CLUB TO MOVE HALL

ACTION DEFERRED UNTIL SITE CAN BE PICKED.

Club directors meet to consider the matter of moving request

Plans for moving the Commercial Club exhibit hall now located at the O. R. & N. depot, to such a point as where it will not interfere with the construction of the proposed depot, were considered at a meeting of the directors last night. Final action was deferred on account of the directors not knowing the exact future location.

The O. R. N. is pressing the Club to move at once, evidently in its desire to clear the ground for construction of the new depot at some early date.

ASSEMBLY EXPLAINED

MANY OF THE FEATURES ARE OUTLINED AGAIN.

Working plan of assemblies made clear to interested readers.

In this period of Oregon politics, words of description of the proposed assembly plan are of interest. A Portland paper in enlarging on the proposed methods, says:

It is suggested by these Republicans that one delegate be elected to the state assembly from every precinct in the state. In the larger precincts the representation would be based on the voting strength of the party, one additional delegate being allowed for each additional 100 voters or major fraction thereof, or on some other similar basis.

The idea proposed contemplates that each precinct have a representation in proportion to its voting strength. In order that the state assembly shall be representative of every county, the practice of giving proxies under this system would be limited to the delegates elected from that county or to some other member of the party in the same county.

It is urged by those favoring this plan that while such an assembly might be considered too large by some, it would not afford an opportunity for anti-assembly men to charge that the gathering was controlled by any combination in the interests of and particular set of candidates. If the selection of delegates to the state assembly is left to the county assemblies it is availed by the advocates of the larger state assembly that it will be easier for selfish candidates to control or at least influence the selection of state delegates by the county assemblies.

Where the membership of the state assembly is elected direct from the precincts, it is contended that the opportunity for organizing the state gathering in the interest of any particular candidate or candidates will be seriously curtailed. In further support of this theory

its supporters argue that with a state assembly elected direct from the party voters in the precincts, the ticket that may be recommended, may more reasonably be expected to receive the united support of the voters throughout the state.

In the interest of insuring a harmonious state assembly, the friends of this plan of organization consider that it is the most equitable that has been devised or suggested.
