# COUNCIL MEETS FOR MID-MONTHLY BUSINESS

Last night the mid-monthly session of the city council took place. The bills filed at the first meeting were ordered paid. An ordinance was passed providing for the suspension of electric lights over the walks. A dog tax ordinance was passed to the second reading. Considerable time was taken up over the payment of a bill for extra work by the American Power Co., there are several councilmen who are not satisfied that the work of laying the Beaver Creek pipe line was done according to contract.

At a former session it was decided not to formally accept the work until such time as the weather would permit of a personal inspection of the pipe line and it was seemingly this general distrust that for a time caused a delay in the payment of this bill for extra work. Mr. Uren, representing the American Water & Power Co., was present and addressed the council. He assured them that no other company would have completed the work in the time his company did and that had the city been doing the work the taxpayers would not have stood for the extra expense in rushing the work during all kinds of weather and that the water would not have been running into the reservoir until summer. He stated he had at previous and various times

invited the council at the expense of the company to view the construction of the work and that he thought it now too late to for suspicions. The bill, after being reduced, was paid.

Several resolutions for the paving of Depot and Adams street were read and referred until the next meeting.
