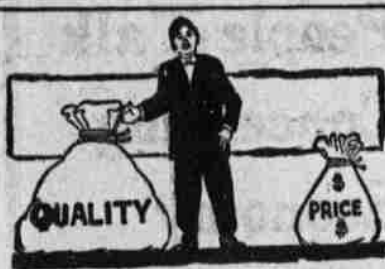

The Post Dispatch publishes the
following from its Des Moines cor-
respondent:

"The stranger incident recorded in
local history occurred when Rhodon

ploded into several hundred pieces,
one of which struck Silas Perkins in
the eye, destroying the sight.

The explosion was caused by a pan

covered his prize duck in a loggy
condition. Telltale marks around the
pan of yeast gave him a clue to the
trouble.

and Perkins ran into the house hold-
ing both hands over one eye.

A surgeon was called and found
that the eyeball had been penetrated
by a fragment of flying duck. He
gave no hope that the sight could
be saved.
