INDIAN FAITH IN WITCH MYTH RECALLED IN PARDON

Pendleton, Feb. 4.—The East Oregonian said last night:
The pardoning of Columbia George the Umatilla Indian murderer yesterday by President Taft recalls one of the most interesting murder cases with which the county of Umatilla has had to deal. George, has been confined in the Federal prison on McNell's Island for several years and was released yesterday on telegraphic information from President Taft.
It will be remembered that Columbia George and Toy-toy murdered an Indian woman by the name of Anna Edna by giving her strychnine in alcohol.
According to the history of the case Columbia George had been visiting Indian friends on the Yakima reservation, previous to the commission of the crime. While there he was taken ill, and was very sick for some time. The medicine man finally told him that there was a witch over here on the Umatilla Indian reservation who was trying to kill him and that it was useless for him to hope to get well until this evil influence was counteracted.
Accordingly George came home and while searching for the alleged witch fell in with Toy-toy. It so happened that Toy-toy's father had died a short time before and that he too was looking for the witch who was responsible for his parent's death. He finally persuaded George that Anna Edna was the evil genius who had caused the death of the old man and was trying to kill George, so they set to work to kill her.
Toy-toy gave George 25 cents with which to purchase coyote-muck-a-muck. The poison was secured at the drug store on the pretense that it was to be used to kill coyotes that were feeding on George's watermelons. A pint of whiskey was purchased at the same time and after having consumed the greater portion of the firewater, the Indians took what was left, added the poison and filled the flask with water. They then went to the home of the woman, persuaded her to drink of the poison and within an hour she was dead.
The two Indians were tried in the local circuit court, were found guilty of murder in the first degree and were sentenced to be hanged. The case was appealed to the state supreme court which ruled the state court had no jurisdiction.
The two Indians were then placed on trial in the Federal court in Portland. The jury rendered a verdict of first degree murder but recommended that the two redmen be imprisoned for life. The recommendation was carried out.
Toy-toy is still in prison while George is a free man. He is 70 years of age and a full-blooded Umatilla Indian.
