JURORS ASK QUESTIONS

ONE HERMANN JUROR WANTS TO KNOW WHY SILVER

Evidence of Harvey Scott about free silver puzzles juror

Portland, Feb. 8.—Albertus H. Metcalf, a juror in the Blinger Hermann trial got into action again this morning and helped to shorten the agony of the Hermann trial which had been suffered by himself and his 11 companions for more than four weeks.

"I would like to ask a question, if permitted," Court told him to ask what he wanted to. "I would like to know" he asked, "what reference the silver question has to the conspiracy to create the Blue Mountain Reserve?" While the court explained the reference, Heney brought the examination of Harvey Scott to an abrupt close. Scott had been called for further examination.

He had been put on the stand in the first instance as a character witness and Heney had drawn a long list of editorials he had written assailing Hermann for his political acts.

End Bank Troubles

Manila, P. I. Feb. 8.—At a meeting today of the stockholders of the Spanish-Filipino Bank, in which there have been some strong factional controversies recently, elected John S. Hord president of the institution. Mr. Hord was formerly collector of internal revenue and is now managing director of the Oriental Products Company. Archbishop Harty and the religious orders control the stock of the bank.

SWOPE NURSE STARTLE JURY

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 8.—A vivid description of the death of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, the capitalist, in whose stomach traces of strychnine was found, was given on the witness stand by Miss Pearl Kellar, the nurse of the Colonel, at the inquest. Miss Kellar said on the day that Swope died Dr. B. C. Hyde brought him a capsule which he said would aid digestion. Twenty minutes later he was seized by convulsions and soon afterwards died, the nurse testified.
