back to a little farm in the state of Ohio where he was born, told of the underground road which was the negro's path to freedom in the early sixties; how his father's homestead was a station on that road to freedom, and then he plunged into the civil war history, not as a historian not as a poet, not as a paid lecturer, but as a boy of 15 who shouldered his musket and went to the front for love of country and of the flag.

He carried his listeners through the sunny southland, dwelt lightly on the hardships of war and brought out in bold relief the fun the soldiers had. His eulogy to the warriors of the grey was heartfelt and noble. It did not smack of popular hypocritical, but on the other hand displayed the friendship existing in American blood even though a great question had to be settled. He told of many battles, the preparation, the temporary fright experienced only to be dispelled by the excitement of musketry and cannonading; tread once more over the battle fields of Shiloh, Antietam, Gettysburg and finally started with Sherman on his march to the sea. His description of the capture of Fort McAllister was told in simple language. It was embellished with no school-made oratory, but it contained that natural inspiration only to be displayed by one who was in the fight.

The doctor had no charts, no moving pictures, no schedules of data printed, for he does not need such. To him, a sto every true American, the civil war was the greatest drama ever enacted, and being one of the actors, he needed only the gift of speech to paint out in words what other than an eye witness could not paint on canvass.

The first five minutes of his talk awakened patriotism in the handful of people present and from that time until he closed applause after applause marked the stirring climaxes of his address. One could almost see Sherman's army sixty thousand and strong as it left Atlanta; you could hear the drum corps, see the flag floating, so vividly was the picture drawn.

The beautiful tribute paid to Lincoln, Grant, Lee (Black Jack) John A. Logan and other generals on both the Union and the Confederate sides was from the heart and stirred everyone present.

Pendleton to Meet Fossil.

Pendleton high school's next debate will be with the team from the Wheeler county high school at Fossil, that team having won out in the three cornered contest with Crook county's high school team from Prineville and the combined team from the schools of Morrow, Wasco and Grass Valley, in Sherman county. The question as to where the debate will be held and which sides will be taken is yet to be settled, says the Pendleton E. O.

The question for discussion will be the commission form of government for cities and will probably be stated: Resolved, that the commission plan for city government insures increased efficiency of service and a decrease of corruption.

Whiston Preaches to Large Audience

Evangelist Whiston delivered a remarkable sermon last evening on "God's Heroes." A large audience listened to the unique discourse. Whiston is winning his way into the confidence of the people.
