SUDDEN DEATH OF ROBERT MILLER

ILL AT TIMES FOR SEVERAL
DAYS—DEATH SUDDEN

Nothing serious about his condition
up to hour of death.

Death's mysterious manner of approach made another demonstration when last night at 9 o'clock, Architect Robert Miller was taken by death after an illness that has dragged along over a few days, spasmodically, but critical illness did not ensue until 30 minutes before death at the family home in South La Grande. Last Saturday Mr. Miller was seized with neuralgia of the heart and suffered considerable pain. On Sunday, however, he was able to return to La Grande. On Monday medical attention was called to him but the attending physician was uncertain as to the nature of the disease.

Yesterday afternoon a second diagnosis of the case was taken and it was ascertained that he had no fever though symptoms of typhoid had been prevalent. During all the time of this indisposition, he was really ill but two short periods. Late last evening he was seized with another attack, which 30 minutes later ended in death.

Accident in Family Today.

This morning more troubles entered the home when Isabelle, the daughter of the late Mr. Miller and the widow, swallowed a pin. She was rushed to Hot Lake to be given X-ray examination but at a late hour today no steps toward removal had been taken. She suffers no pain and results may or may not be serious. At any rate the child's plight has interfered with funeral arrangements. It is probable that short services will be held at the home tomorrow afternoon, and still briefer services at the church later. This, however, has not been definitely decided upon, and will not be until the condition of the unfortunate child at Hot Lake is definitely ascertained.

Besides the widow there are three children to survive the architect. Isabelle, Robert and an infant child. William Miller is a brother of the deceased. Mrs. Kirk, a sister of this city and Archie Miller, a brother of Enterprise survive.

The unusual suddenness of death was a shock to the city. Mr. Miller, in his unostentatious way had made many friends here during his residence in La Grande. His brain plan of the M. & M. Co's building and the J. J. Holmes residence on 4th street is the product of his thinking. This is the second La Grande architect that has met sudden death within the past few months.
