NEW WATER RATES TO BE ADOPTED

COUNCIL ADOPTS RECOMMENDATIONS FOR LOWER RATES.

Sewer bond issue placed on coming city election ticket.

I was nearly midnight when the city solons ceased their labors last night. Aside from passing a resolution to submit to the voters at the coming city election March 14, the proposition to vote for or against the authority of issuing sewerage bonds to the amount of \$40,000, nothing but routine work was considered but there were many things to require action.

Eight near beer applications were presented but final action was averted by referring them to the judiciary committee, who made no report last night.

The preliminary work for holding the city election was completed by the selection of the voting places and the appointment of judges and clerks.

The water rates recommended at the last meeting by the water committee were adopted and will become effective as soon as an ordinance can be prepared and passed. This will mean a considerable reduction, especially for irrigation.

Eighteen hundred feet of new water mains was recommended by the Water Committee to be placed on Adams Avenue before the same was macadamized and paved. Also new pipe 18 inches from the reservoir to C. Street.
