MANY RIOTS OF STRIKERS

(Continued from Page one) operate cars during the night but confined their efforts to preparing for service today.

Scores of strikebreakers have been brought to the city and lodged at the various car barns under the protection of special police.

As a result of yesterday's rioting, 20 policemen and 30 citizens lie in the hospitals. Hundreds are under arrest. The rioters burned 297 cars.

The crowds are not so large as they were yesterday when rioting resulted in serious injury to dozens of persons among the police and mob. During the morning hours a drizzling rain has been falling, but although the walking is bad, working men refused to ride on the cars.

Enlistment of 3000 specials was considered by National Organizer Pratt, of the platform men as an indication of weakness by the company and tacit admission that the company is licked.

Leading men the labor council have been considering a call for a general strike of all union men in Philadelphia as soon as it becomes apparent that the Union car men are likely to lose.

The present strike of the carmen was called following the dismissal by the company of several employees actively engaged in Union organizing and a refusal to reinstate the men upon demand by the Union officials.

Two million gallon capacity receptacle will soon be erected.

It was thought last summer that the new reservoir would have to be constructed before the Beaver Creek project was put in operation but this was avoided. The new tank will hold 2,000,000 gallons, and it is to be built of reinforced concrete.
