**BOY STRUCK  
BY ENGINE**

**HURLED THIRTY FEET BUT NOT  
HURT MUCH**

Local boy meets with wonderfully fortunate accident.

To be hit by a rapidly moving mail train, hurled 30 feet and not injured beyond a few minor scratches is the wonderful escapade of "Push" Walsh, son of Dispatcher Ed. Walsh, early this morning. Mr. Walsh, Jr., was leaving the depot platform to cross the mainline tracks and at the same instant a snowplow caught his eye. He stopped to study the machine for an instant. Simultaneously Number 10, the fast mail train, was approaching at a rapid speed, drifting along noiselessly. Though the bell rang, it failed to attract his attention. Snow partly blinded him, too. The whole affair, the stepping on the track at the time the train was approaching, and the momentary stop on the part of the pedestrian, occupied but the fraction of a minute. At any rate, he was struck by the coming train and hurled 30 feet before he struck the ground again. The engine passed the depot at a rapid rate and why he was not instantly killed is a wonder.

He was hurried to Dr. C. T. Bacon's office for examination but the minutest scrutiny cannot locate any injury beyond a few scratches and a bruised back. Walsh can walk about today, though of course with some difficulty.
