tribution under the company's profit-sharing plan for the first year ending February 28, 1910, will be at the rate of five cents a hundred pounds.

The distribution for the year of 1906 when the profit-sharing plan was adopted, was at the rate of ten cents a hundred pounds, and for the two succeeding years it was fifteen cents a hundred pounds.

It has been reported that the company will abandon the plan after this year, but according to the management no decision has been reached in the matter. For the three years, up to February 27, 1909, that the profit-sharing plan has been in operation, the Corn Product Refining Company and its subsidiaries have reserved \$1,780,000 to be distributed among their customers who have bought from them exclusively. The

disbursement on account of the 1909 business it is said will amount to about \$300,000.
