Oregon Agricultural College, Feb. 28 (Special)—Twenty-six students have been dropped from the rolls of the Oregon Agricultural College and 45 others have been placed on probation because of failure to satisfy the scholastic requirements during the first semester.

The work as a whole has been better this year than ever before. The faculty is determined, however, to keep the grade of work up by dropping those students who fall behind because of failure to make proper application. To this end the parents and guardians will be asked to cooperate. At the close of each semester a report of the standings of each student will be sent directly to the parent or guardian.
