Reinforcements Come.
New Orleans, Mar. 1.—The government forces of Nicaragua were reinforced by 500 Honduran soldiers according to dispatches from the front today.

The Hondurans have joined Madriz at Managua. It is believed they are commanded by Gen. Lara. It is reported that many Salvadorans are also fighting for Madriz.

Last stand at Managua.
New Orleans, March 1.—The forces of the government, overwhelmed by odds, fighting with make shift weapons, hungry and dispirited, are desperately holding Managua, according to dispatches received here yesterday.

The revolutionary army under the leadership of Chamorro are closing in on the capital. Messages received here confirm the report of the battle of Elmorita in which Gen. Romorra of the government army was killed and 200 government troopers taken prisoners. A junction of provisional forces under Chamorro and Estrada is reported to have taken place and fall of the capitol is expected soon.

4,000 Watchmakers Return.
Boston, March 1.—Four thousand watchmakers today returned to work in the Waltham Watch plant Company, which had been shut down for a short time in order to curtail expenses.
