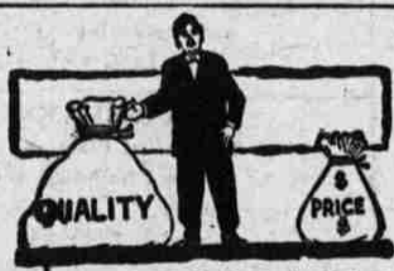

### MAKE TRIANGULAR AFFAIR

Arrangements attempted that will give all a fair chance.

At the instigation of local debaters and debate promoters, a triangular debate between Pendleton, La Grande and Baker City may take shape in the spring. When Baker City and La Grande tied for honors, and made it an expensive proposition and an inconvenient system necessary if dual debates were used to ferret out the real champions of Eastern Oregon. If the new plan prevails, each of the three towns will have two teams and the winners in that way will stand for the championship of everything in all of Eastern Oregon. On the other hand the winners of the local dual debate will have to prepare for and meet Pendleton in another dual affair.

### G. W. HUNT DEAD.

Well known in Grande Ronde valley built Hunt road.

G. W. Hunt, a well known pioneer resident of this section, and builder of the Hunt road, now the Pendleton-Posco Northern Pacific branch, is dead. He died Saturday at his home at 811 Irving street, Portland. The following account of his life and work is from the Oregon Journal.

Born in New York in 1842, he started West when only 16. When they reached Denver, Mr. Hunt's companions accepted a job shingling, but Hunt refused employment, declaring he had determined to start in business for himself. For a time he found nothing. One day he met by the merest chance a man with two yoke of oxen who had become too ill to continue his work. Hunt hired the oxen for a dollar per day per yoke. Then he found a wagon which he paid a dollar per day for.

### Began Teaming Business.

In this way he began his business of teaming between The Dalles, Boise and Ogden, a business which soon reached considerable proportions and formed the basis for his fortune. After coming to Oregon Mr. Hunt built more than 500 miles of the O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific lines. Through his work much of the then desert region was opened up for settlement.

Mr. Hunt built and operated several short lines of railroad in the vicinity of Walla Walla. His last active enterprise was the conducting of a large farm. Four years ago, after 16 years of residence in the vicinity of Portland, he was taken ill and never left his bed again. He survived by his wife and four children, Charles W. and Guy L. Hunt of Half Way, Ore., C. C. Hunt of Nyssa, Ore., and Lily M. Hunt, Portland.
