STREET IMPROVEMENT TONIGHT

Street commissioners will report and protests will be heard also

Streets and street improvements will occupy a major portion of the council's attention tonight. An opportunity will be given for Adams Ave. property owners to protest against the proposed hard surface pavement, the figures being this time inclusive of curbing and sewer arrangements. Another batch of property owners who will be given an opportunity to protest will be the Elm street crowd.

Reports of commissioners from a half dozen macadam districts will be heard. These commissions stipulated the apportionment and fixed the probable amount which paving will increase the value of the property. Commissions from West Adams avenue from Fourth to Aider, on Greenwood, Pennsylvania, Fifth and Sixth streets will make this estimate tonight. Protest permission on these streets will follow later.

The only protest advanced previously for paving Adams Ave, was that paving should follow a sewer system and now that the sewer can be provided for, if the bond issue carries, there should be no detriment to this popular and much needed improvement.
