To Abolish the Quee

Hong Kong, March 3—One of the most noteworthy proofs of China's advancement into the ways of the civilized world is afforded by the imperial edict, effective this month, which permits Chinese to cut off their queues without losing cast. Formerly a china man without a que was looked upon as an abandoned creature, especially in the interior towns, where they were often subject to gross indignities.

The que was introduced into China during the Manchu dynasty, nearly three centuries ago. It is said to have been originally suggested to Manchus by their sense of gratitude to the horse, that animal having played a great part in the Tartarian conquests. In short the "pigtail" was a method of establishing a relationship between human beings and the horse.
