**BANQUET IS
ELABORATE**

**DISTINCTLY A BUSINESS AND
CHURCH AFFAIR**

Two elements blend amably during course of evening's events

From 7 until 10 last night the new tabernacle was the scene of one of the really nicest church-businessmen's affairs that has occurred here in some time. There was a delicious feast, ear-soothing music, and there were well thought out addresses from men in the pulpits and men out of these ranks. Nearly two hundred people met and shook hands with evangelist Johnson, and his coming to La Grande was really auspicious. He ended the toasts with a very informal talk, in which he expressed a deep appreciation for the honor conferred him and La Grande immediately learned that this particular revivalist differs considerably from the rang and file of his class. His appearance and his brief remarks last night brand him as a logical thinker, a broadminded individual, whose line of campaign will be along a consistent, persistent presentation of religious truths and not an upheaval of existing theories and principles as is sometimes the case.

Doctor S. W. Seemann presided as toastmaster in his clever style, calling on responses first from W. L. Brenholts who touched upon the relation of a church to the community. His speech was pointed and well rendered. F. E. Bridges won for himself much praise for his brief but clear-cut opinions on the church's challenge to men and Rev. H. E. McLeod—called the businessman preacher—spoke knowingly on the relation of the church to business.

Walter M. Pierce, always equal to a toast occasion, went into the philosophical principles of what men expect of the church and Rev. F. M. Canfield of the M. E. Church South, answered in a sister topic of what the church expects of men. Then came the informal address of Evangelist Johnson. From first to last the event was pleasing and no small amount of credit is due the ladies who so skillfully and under excellent generalship, served the large attendance. Messrs. Charles H. Gray, Cochran, Cochran, Cleaver and Williams and the High School Orchestra, supplied the music. The menu served as follows:
