EVIDENCE  
IS LACKING

Though it occurred about six weeks ago, it has just become general knowledge that a detective was in Pendleton for several days in search of violations of the local option law. That he found violations of the law is stated in his report which is now in the hands of Sheriff Taylor, but that he did not find sufficient evidence upon which to base prosecution is evident from the fact that no arrests or prosecutions have followed as a result of his visit, relates the Pendleton E. O.

The detective was hired from the Thell agency by Sheriff T. D. Taylor on the approval of the county court. The bill for his services was presented to the county court at this session and was allowed yesterday afternoon, being approximately \$166. Though Commissioner Walker refused to sign the order authorizing the payment of the bill it is not believed there will be any protest made on the payment of it.

It is said that the detective succeeded in purchasing whisky in at least one place in the city and also secured a beverage which he declared looked like and tasted like real beer, though it also understood that the bulk of the drink emporium proprietors of the city were aware of the presence of a detective. It seems the officer erred in not taking someone with him to corroborate his testimony. No further action will probably be taken in the matter though the information secured by the detective will be retained by Sheriff Taylor to be used by him in the future.

O. A. C. ITEMS.

Corvallis, March 7—(Special)—The O. R. & N. railway company in conjunction with the Oregon Agricultural College will run an agricultural demonstration train through Eastern Oregon between the 24th and 31st of March. The train will include cars fully equipped for demonstration work—Agronomy, horticulture, dairy husbandry and poultry husbandry. Members of the experiment station staff and the College instructional staff will give lectures and conduct the demonstrations.

An International Club has been formed at the Oregon Agricultural College. Only students who are foreign born are eligible to membership. At the first meeting fifteen students were present representing Japan, Russia, England, Norway, India, China, Denmark and Germany. There are several more foreign born students in the College who have since signified their intention of joining the Club.

The purpose of the organization is to provide social privileges and offer greater opportunities for educational work to the students who have journeyed to this country in order to gain an education.

River Is Falling

The water in the Umatilla river is still slowly falling, being about a foot lower this afternoon than it was at the highest stage Wednesday.
