### Cotton Prints Advance.

Fall River, Mass., March 8.—The American Printing Company put into effect today another advance, raising cotton prints one-half cent per yard, and shirting one quarter cent per yard. The Algonquin Company has announced its intentions to follow suit.

This advance to a six cent basis is the third from the low mark of 43-4 cents to which prints were cut on May 1 of last year. The first increase announced on July 26 and effective August to tenth was five cents. On November 15 a raise to 5 1-2 cents was announced which went into effect on November 24. The new quotation puts prints at the highest level since May 28 1908, when they were cut from six cents to 4 3-4.

### Sale of City Bonds

Toronto, March 8.—Five hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars in 4 per cent bonds were placed today by the city treasurer. The proceeds will be used principally for school improvements.

### Expect Prosperous Year

Des Moines, Ia., March 8.—Members of the Iowa Threshermen Association of the number of two or three hundred are in attendance at the session opened here today. With prospects of good crops the members are hopeful of a prosperous year.
