FIRST TRAIN FROM WALLOWA TODAY

SIXTEEN HOURS REQUIRED TO MAKE RUN

Rest Law Invoked on Joseph Crew Here This Morning

After struggling for 16 hours the imprisoned crew on the train which has been stalled in Wallowa county for eight days, reached La Grande this morning at eight o'clock, bringing the first train from Wallowa since the trouble began. Because they were out 16 hours the rest law was invoked and the returning train did not leave for Joseph until 2:30 this afternoon, with the expectations of reaching Joseph tonight. A freight train was sent toward Joseph at seven this morning.

A heap of express and mail, eight days accumulation, was taken out this afternoon on the departing train and a great effort will be made to have the train reach its destination. Slides are frequent, though they are not usually large and can be encountered with crews of men. Conductor Grady was in charge of the imprisoned train.

GREAT NORTHERN TRAINS, TOO

Great Northern and Northern Pacific maybe, will pass here.

According to reports prevalent today, Northern Pacific and perhaps the Great Northern passenger trains will be run over the O. S. L. and the O. R. & N. tracks during the present troubles in Montana. According to reports, these trains are to start this detour at once. Number Seven, due this morning, is marked up for 5 o'clock tonight, and Number Six, the Portland train, is several hours late.

San Francisco, March 8.—Following an investigation by the State Senate Committee on the cost of high living, Attorney General Webb today promises a prosecution of wholesalers alleged to have combined to keep the price of fish at a certain figure. The testimony tended to show that members of the alleged fish trust prevented the dealers from purchasing fish from the Puget Sound or Columbia river.
