CIVIL CASE ON TODAY

GRAND JURY WILL LIKELY BE DISMISSED TOMORROW

Chandler case may come to hearing tomorrow at early hour

The Court during the forenoon and up to the time of going to press was occupied with the case of A. C. Palmer vs. C. L. England, suing on a promissory note amounting to \$450. The Rube Chandler case follows this case and probably a portion of the jury may be secured this evening.

The case of Frank Brown, Admr. vs. Franklin Truax, the court directed the jury to bring in a verdict for the plaintiff, which they did for the sum of \$328.

J. R. Thompson, charged with violating the local option law at Kameela, was arraigned and entered a plea of not guilty.

Following the Chandler case will be the State vs. C. W. Jones of Union, charged with violating the local option law.

Witnesses have been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury tomorrow morning, so that body will, of course, continue in session until tomorrow sometime. It was thought possible that the final report would be filed this afternoon.

Mr. Parker, a local boy, convicted of connection with the Oliver lard stealing fracas, was brought up from the penitentiary last night to appear as a witness in the perjury charge against Chandler. He is in charge of a prison guard.

JAKE VANDERMEULEN DEAD

Demise occurs at San Jose this morning—A local pioneer.

Jake Vandermeulen, one of the pioneers of this city and well known locally, died at San Jose this morning, leaving an immediate family and several relatives here. Mr. Vandermeulen came to La Grande in '64, with his brothers Ate and Orange Vandermeulen, now residents of this

city. He is survived by his wife, children and two brothers and two sisters here, Mrs. Bussey and Mrs. Charles Hutchins. He owned considerable property in and around the city.

Pork Goes Up.

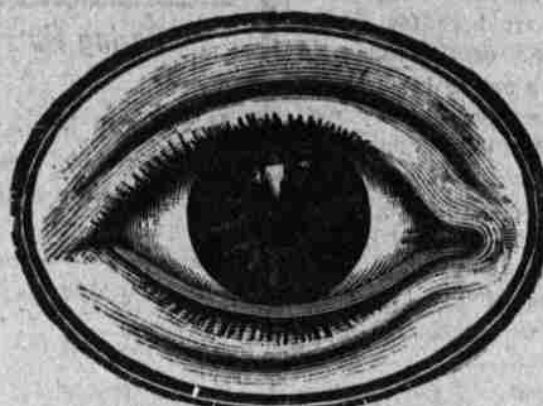
St. Louis, March 9.—One of the results of the "meat strike" which was started to lower the price of meats came today in an announcement from
