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## GOOD LEASES THE SOMMER

**J. E. FOLEY TO RESUME HIS OWN  
MANAGEMENT****J. B. FISHER OF SOMMER  
TO LEAVE BUSINESS FIELD**

General shakeup in management of local hotels coming at once when George Good takes over the Sommer, after having it remodeled with in-Foley to take his own establishment in few days.

There has been a general shakeup in the hotel business and management in this city during the present month. J. E. Foley, owner of the Foley building will resume the management of the hotel after having leased the building for the past several years, and Geo. E. Good, who has been the lessee, has secured a long time lease on the Sommer House and will take charge about April 1st. J. B. Fisher who for the past two years has been managing the Sommer House, has been in quite poor health and will retire for the present.

He will close the house on March 16th, after which Mr. Good will spend several days and considerable money in remodeling the hostelry.

During the period Mr. Good has been identified with the business interests of this city he has made a host of friends who will be pleased to learn that he will continue to remain with us.

### STARKEY ROAD OPEN

Ice has melted away and it is now possible to go up the river.

Though there is no obstacle in the way of driving from La Grande to Hilgard, the Hilward Starkey road is open. Postmaster Lewis of Hilgard reports the telephone line in working order again, the stage running regularly and the roads in fairly good shape. Teams from La Grande come as far as the missing bridge

and from there the people must walk to Hilgard.

### BANKS SHOW INCREASE

Enormous increase of deposits in Oregon banks is shown.

Salem, March 10.—At the close of business on Jan. 31st, the deposits in Oregon banks, including national and private had increased since November last \$1,265,388. The statement is just issued by the bank examiner. A total deposit of \$91,314,138 is reported.

### Honor First Cardinal

New York, March 10.—A solemn pontifical mass was celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral in memory of Cardinal McCloskey, America's first representative in the congress of the Roman Catholic Church, who was born 100 years ago today. This evening a centennial celebration will be held under the auspices of the laity in the Catholic Club. At the Cathedral services the clergy of the entire diocese was present and bishops and provincials of the different orders sat in sanctuary.

Although Cardinal McCloskey died almost a quarter of a century ago his memory is very green. He was America's first cardinal New York's only cardinal and there was only one other in this country that has sat in the College of the church. The other member of the Sacred College was Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore. It was Cardinal Gibbons, then Archbishop, who preached the funeral sermon of Cardinal McCloskey.

The first Cardinal lies buried in the Cathedral in a crypt under the Holy Altar, and suspended from the ceiling directly over it is a red hat which is to hang there until it crumbles to dust in ruins.

### Run on Cumberland Bank

Cleveland, March 10.—A run on the Society of the Savings and Mutual Savings Association started yesterday and continued today. The institution has deposits of \$49,000,000 and 70,000 depositors. Former governor Herrick is president. Bank examiners say the bank is in excellent condition.

### Thirty Workmen Buried

Pittsburg, March 10.—Bodies of twenty men have been removed from the ruins of a wall which collapsed and buried 30 workmen of the Lanz and Sons' mill bolt factory. Many were injured.

Oliver and elsewhere. Where did you attend? An offering is taken each evening for the sole purpose of defraying the expenses current; no part goes to Mr. Johnson at all.

## GRAND JURY IS EXCUSED

**FINE TRUE BILLS AND ONE NOT  
TRUE BILL****RECOMMENDATIONS FEW AND  
REPORT IS VERY BRIEF**

Chandler case will come to hearing late this afternoon and special venire is ordered to fill out the jury. Fourteen jurors hear three cases—England jury retires at a late hour today.

Having found 10 true bills and one not true bill, bringing in two of the true bills late this afternoon, the March grand jury asked late this afternoon to be excused. The report filed at the conclusion of the work was not a long one, proceeding in the usual way to state that the court officers are well kept and that officials were "courteous."

The jury visited the poor farm and recommended that a milch cow be purchased for the inmates and that a flume and ditch be constructed to provide irrigation. With this recommendation they ask to be excused. Only a few of their true bills have been made public up to date.

After conducting the first three jury cases with 14 jurors on the entire list Circuit Court came to a halt today temporarily and a special venire was ordered drafted into service for conduct of the Reuben Chandler perjury case which was intended for yesterday's business but which did not come up for action until after 10 o'clock today. The England jury retired at 1 o'clock. It is planned to have Frank Parker testify at the opening of the trial that he may be taken back to the penitentiary at Salem.

### Jury Asks Instructions

At 2 o'clock the England jury returned for additional instructions from the court, retiring immediately afterwards to resume deliberations.

### Palmer Wins Suit

The Palmer jury returned a verdict late today favoring A. C. Palmer, suing Charles England, for \$336.12 and \$40 additional for attorney fees.

At 3:30 this afternoon the attorneys are still sparring with jurors, but it is believed evidence will be taken tonight. The indictment charging Chandler follows:

### The Indictment

Orel Chandler is charged by the Grand Jury of the crime of perjury committed as follows:

The said Orel Chandler on the 25th of February, 1909 did wrongfully, unlawfully, willfully and feloniously, when then and there on his examination as a witness, duly sworn to testify the truth, in the trial at action at law in the circuit court, in which action the state of Oregon was plaintiff and the defendant, Orel Chandler, jointly indicted with Roy Halley and Frank Parker, as the defendant charged with having committed the crime of burglary, not in a dwelling, on February 6th 1909, that defendant Chandler then and there testified falsely that he was not out of the city limits of La Grande and did not go outside of the said city limits at any time during said 6th day of February and 7th day of said month and that he was not during any of said time at or on the "Lige Oliver Ranch," the same being located about eight miles east of La Grande and that the said testimony was in the following interrogatories of said trial: "You may state whether or not you went at any time during the 6th and 7th day of February, 1909, out of the city of La Grande?" Ans.: "I was not." "You may state whether or not on the above date were you at any time on the Lige

Oliver ranch?" Ans.: "I was not out that way at all; wasn't out of town, not even out of the city limits."

### SNOWFALL HEAVY

Palouse country has the worst in 27 years

Spokane, March 10.—Reports from the Palouse country indicate that the snowfall in outside districts in the past winter was the heaviest in 27 years. At many points it amounted to over six feet. The snow is nearly all gone and plowing will be in progress within a week.

### Wreck at Seattle.

Seattle, March 10.—Express Messenger Fred Anderson of St. Paul, was severely injured and many hurt by flying glass when two Northern Pacific trains collided in the local yards last night. The accident was caused by the failure of a switching crew to place red lights in the rear of a train being switched.

### HEARING OVER SOON.

Ballinger evidence is mostly all circumstantial

Washington, March 10.—"Prosecution" in the Ballinger investigation before the congressional committee practically ends with the testimony of former Secretary Garfield today. Much of the evidence is circumstantial and much depends upon inference.

### ROAD CLEAR AGAIN

First train since disaster passes the Wellington tunnel

Wellington, March 10.—For the first time since Feb. 25th, Wellington has communication with the outside world today and tonight the first train to pass over the main line of the Great Northern Co. two weeks, will pass through the tunnel. Rescuers from the East side finished the task last night. The remaining drift will be attacked today.

### CALDWELL BOY IN GRIEF

Sister in Baker City sends money with which to flee

Colusa, Calif., March 10.—A printer named Hemple is under arrest here charged with embezzlement at Caldwell, Idaho. The arrest followed a debauch during which a letter was found in his pocket from Ruth Hemple a sister, at Baker City, enclosing \$50 with which to use for the alleged purpose of fleeing to Central America.

### Cancer Cure Found

Rome, March 10.—It is reported to day that J. P. Morgan will probably contribute financial aid to Prof. Ram-poldi of the University of Pavia, who declares he has discovered a cure for cancer. The treatment consists of making local applications with an ointment made from a plant grown in India called Jacquerry.

## CLAMOR FOR AGREEMENT

**MASS MEETING OF PHILADELPHIA  
PEOPLE TONIGHT****URGENT DEMANDS FROM THE  
PEOPLE FOR PEACE AGAIN**

Hoping to bring pressure on both sides for concessions, the citizens of Philadelphia to gather in mass meeting tonight—Leaders say more open shop men will strike immediately.

Philadelphia, March 10.—Alarmed at the prospective spread of the general strike, business interests here called for a mass meeting for tomorrow in an effort to settle the industrial strife. An effort will be made to compel both sides to make concessions in the interests of peace.

Labor leaders today are elated and confident. They predict that the walkout of the employees of the Baldwin Locomotive Works yesterday will be a forerunner of a series of strikes in "open shop" factories which will compel the street car company to come to terms.

Ten thousand men engaged in a riot in the vicinity of the city hall this afternoon in which many policemen were disarmed and beaten senseless. Mounted police then arrived and rode down the rioters. The riot followed the breaking up of a procession of laboring men.

### Yast Coal Strike Planned

Chicago, March 10.—If a general strike of the mine workers in the bituminous fields of the middle west and Ohio districts is called on April 1st at least 240,000 men will walk out, according to estimates made by labor leaders today.

### F. K. Arnold Suicides

Los Angeles, March 10.—Frederick K. Arnold, superintendent of the Portland Safety Deposit Company, of Portland, Oregon, committed suicide in a room of the Hollenbeck Hotel today, using a revolver. He has been ill. He was prominent in business and society for years.

### Anarchist Is Released

St. Petersburg, March 10.—It is learned today on good authority the reason that Nicholas Tschalkovsky was acquitted of criminal revolutionary activity was because the government feared international complication on account of a strong sentiment favoring him in America and England.
