Chance for fallure but such is not likely-Effective soon.

Reduced distributive rates on merchandise shipped from Portland over the O. R. & N. to points in Oregon east of The Dalles will be put into effect by the railroad March 20th, in accordance with teh order of the railroad commission of Oregon, entered April 22, 1908.

heve heretofre been in existence, and were ordered by the Railroad Commission, after a bearin gon a comulaint filed July 20, 1907, by the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The controversy over the distributive rate has been pending either before the Railroad Commission or in the Flederal Courts for nearly three

Case Not Definitely Settled.

After a hearing the Railraod Comrission ordered a reduction on firstlass rates between Portland a il points east of The Dalles by a mount equal to one-sixth of the ifference between The Dalles ra 25 cents) and the existing first-class ates between Portland and points ast of The Dalles and to reduce all ther class rates so they would bear the same proportion to the first-class rate, as is provided by the compa ny's distance tariff.

As stated, this reduction is equialent to rates about 14 per cent less than the existing rates.
