Ordinance No 445 Series 1910
An ordinance declaring a special assessment to pay for the improvement of a portion of Main avenue in improvement district no 3 by building cement sidewalk in front of lot six in Block 10 Grandy's addition to La Grande and cement crosswalk on alley between lot 5 and 6 in said portion of Main avenue in front of

said described lots by building a cement sidewalk in front of said lot 6, and a cement crosswalk on the alley between said lot 6 and lot 5 in said block 10 as follows:

Mrs. Media Proebstel, owner of lot 6 and lot 5 in said block 10 above described, for sidewalk on lot 6 and half of said alley \$235.85
F. L. Meyers owner of lot 5 in said block 10, for half of cost of crosswalk between lots 5 and 6 in block 10 \$19.05

Section two—That the recorder of the city of La Grande is hereby directed to enter this upon the book of liens and make out and prepare a special assessment roll and collect said assessment: The Recorder shall also at once give five days' notice by publication in a newspaper in the city, when said assessment shall become delinquent. Provided, however that said liens may be paid in instalments.

Section three—This ordinance shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer and after its approval by the mayor, it shall take effect on and after the 12 day of April 1910.

Passed the council on the 9th day of March 1910 by five members voting therefor.

Approved this 10th day of March, 1910. M. K. Hall, Mayor.

STORY OF THE PLAY

"The American Lord," a four-act comedy by George H. Broadhurst and Charles T. Dazey is the offering for Wednesday March 16 at the Steward Opera House.
In brief the story of "the Ameri-

can Lord" is that of John Breuster, a North Dakota Farmer who is about to be nominated for congress when he learns that through the death of a Lord Breuster he has become heir to the title and estates of the fine old English home. He gives up his idea of going to Washington, and, although having little liking for some of the ways of the English, crosses the ocean to claim his own. With his hereditary feud with the house of Wycherly and his good-natured attempts to introduce his American methods of doing things, Breuster himself occupied. Imagine his feelings, then, when he discovers that

his daughter and the son of Lord Wycherly are in love and that his son has lost his heart to an English girl. Breuster makes it three of a kind by falling in love with an attractive Irish lady and the story is ended happily.

The play is one of the brightest, most wholesome of the stage offerings in recent years, and the excellent company will give it the rendition it deserves. The part of John Breuster is in the hands of Cash. B. Hanford, one of the strongest actors on the American stage and in it he is said to have found one of the very best sympathetic roles of his artistic

career. The Irish lady is Marie Dronah, a charming and accomplished actress who has been Mr. Hanford's woman in Shakespearian parts for several years.
