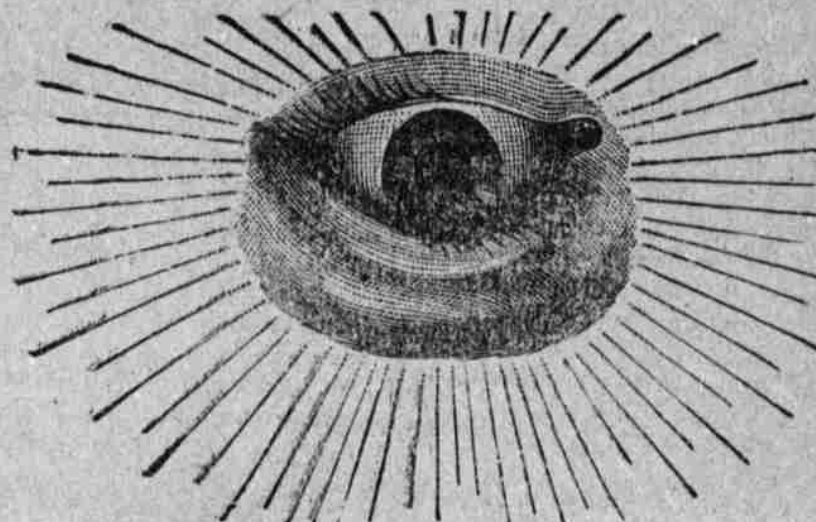
Commercial interests today continued in their efforts to find a way to settle the strike. A meeting is
