Report of the Board of Inquiry.
La Grande, March 11, 1910.—Following is the report of the Board of Inquiry on the derailment of Freight Train Evtra No. 366 West, near N23-

chain Oregon, March 10, 1910.
Extra 366 West, consisting of 41 cars, 1500 tons, Conductor Regan, Engineer Thornburg, had three cars derailed two miles west of Meacham, damaging equipment to the extent of \$1000, track \$10 and contents of the cars \$50. No one injured and no trains delayed.

Investigation shows derailment was caused by a broken journal on the forward wheel of freight truck on A. R. B. No. 5725 which caused derailment of the following two cars. Two thirds of the broken journal shows old flaw; journal had not been overheated. Contents of the car were canned meats, destination San Francisco.
