New York, March 14.—It is rumored here today that Dr. Cook, the discredited explorer, and his wife intend to sail for the United States from Rio Janeiro March 18th.

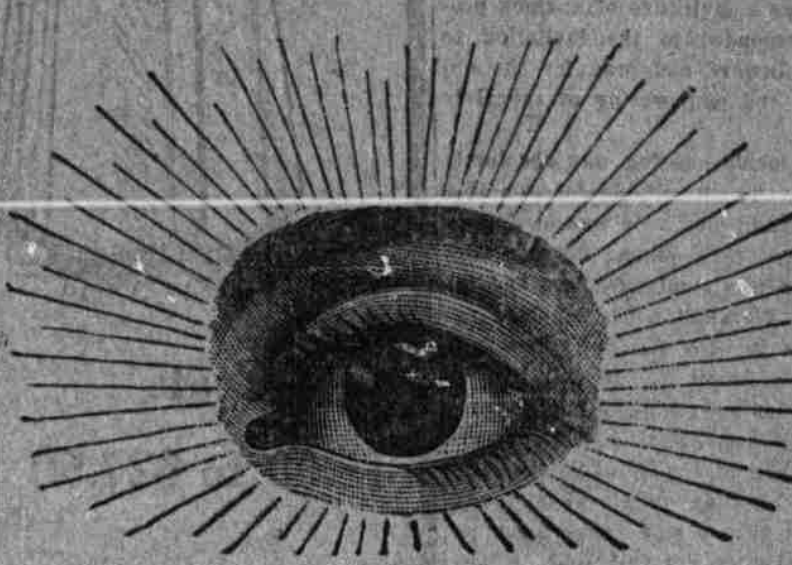
