Watscka, Ill., March 15.—Mrs. J. B. Saylor, on trial for the alleged murder of her husband, a banker at Crescent City, fainted in court today when she heard the state prosecutor tell a venireman she would be sent to the gallows if convicted.

The prosecution announced that Ira Gruden would not be prosecuted for connection with the case. Gruden, Mrs. Saylor's brother, is said to have been sleeping off a debauch and the prosecution held that after the killing of Saylor his acts were legally excusable, considering the relationship to the defendants.

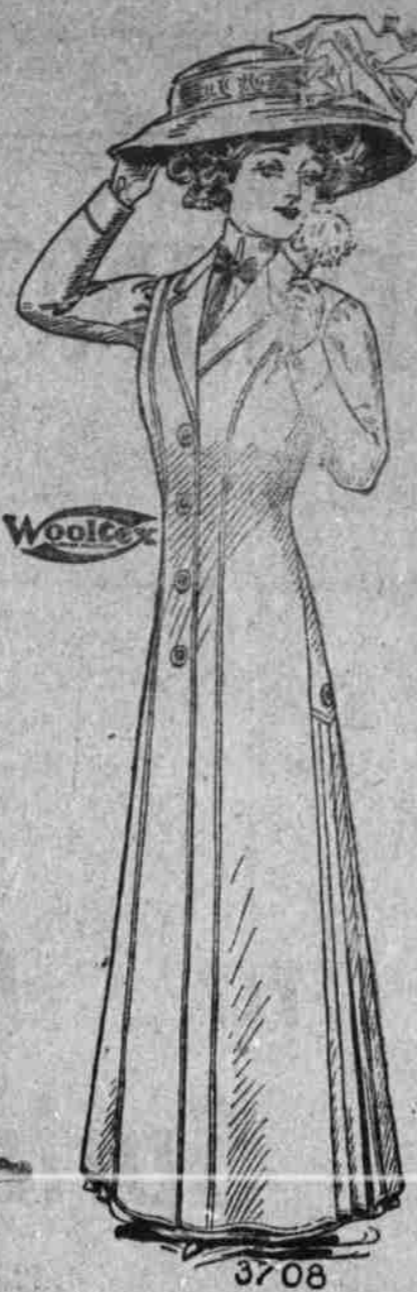
