Watseka, Ill., March 16.—Mrs. J. B. Saylor, jointly indicted with Dr. Miller and John Grunden, for the murder of her banker husband was today broken by the strain of the trial and the hisses of the spectators in the court room, and today lies on a cot in the hospital cell of the county jail.

"It's a wicked lie" she scolded "to say there was ever anything improper in my friendship for Dr. Miller. Our friendship was Platonic and pure."

Mrs. Saylor intimated that the real cause for the quarrel that led to the killing was financial worry by her husband. She declares her husband was bankrupt and had worried until he became insane.
