Advertisements for bids for the construction of either bituminous asphalt or hessian pavement for Adams avenue from Fourth street to Hemlock, a distance of about seven blocks, from Fourth to Jefferson on Depot, a distance of three blocks, were ordered made last night. One local paper, one Portland paper and one Seattle paper will carry the ad. 15 days.

The bids will be opened at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of March 31 and from then on pavement will proceed without further delay.
