Took His Quarry Unawares

With Leo Kent and O. L. Simpkins in custody, Sheriff T. D. Taylor returned yesterday evening from his successful chase after the escaped criminals. Four of the seven runaways are again behind prison bars and all efforts are now being centered on the apprehension of Peter Bloom, Harry Ray and Cleveland Gould.

Lent and Simpkins were overtaken about 1 o'clock yesterday while they were still in their midway camp. The sheriff rode in on them while they were dismounted and a considerable distance so they had no chance to make a fight or run for their freedom. At the command from the officer to put up their hands they put them up as high as they could reach without a moment's hesitation.

An interesting feature of the case was the fact that while Sheriff Taylor was sitting in the Marlin residence near the summit of the mountains Monday night, Lent and Simpkins came up to the house and looked through the window. They did not recognize the officer, however, so proceeded about their business, which was to steal hay for their horses which were tied in a deep canyon, about three-quarters of a mile below the house. It also developed that the escaped prisoners had been to the house in the afternoon and had stolen some sugar, coffee and other provisions, as well as a pair of wire cutters with which to cut through fences. Some blankets were also taken—Pendleton E.
