LOCAL FIRM WILL SELL IT AT COST

What is probably first carload lot here for distribution

A car load of lime and sulphur spray compound arrived today consigned to C. O. Ramsey, the well known local shipper.

This is said to be the first carload of spray material ever brought into the valley. It is the standard compound, scientifically prepared, making a spray of uniform strength and known effectiveness, recommended by all experiment stations, etc. The state institutions urge its use as against the use of home made and often ineffective sprays, which have been largely used in this district in the past. The compound will be supplied to the users at cost and is surely a move in the right direction. A move towards better fruit and better prices. It is understood that the dealers of the Cove district have pooled their orders and will receive their spray delivered by rail to Cove.
