FRANCE AFTER COLORED MEN

IN REORGANIZING COLONIAL ARMY WANTS FIGHTERS.

Colored men who fought under Yankee flag recommended

Manila, March 19.—It was learned today that the French counsel in the Philippines is attempting to enlist colored officers and troopers who have served in the United States army in the newly reorganized French colonial army. The French war office has issued a circular outlining the preparation for the establishment of a colonial force of 300,000 colored volunteers. The circular gives special mention to the bravery of the American colored troops in Cuba and the Philippines and orders the counsel to secure as many as possible.
