## CORONER AT WELLINGTON

**Thunder storm may have caused the Wellington disaster**

Seattle, March 21.—The coroner's jury investigating the Wellington disaster left for Wellington this morning to complete taking evidence. A verdict is expected tonight.

Joseph Benler, a timber cruiser, walked into the morgue here yesterday, looked at a corpse tagged with his name. "Some mistake," he said, "I missed the train."

Seattle, March 21.—(Special)—A thunder storm was the cause of the Wellington avalanche on the Great Northern railroad is the opinion of E. P. Saunders, assistant professor of geology in the University of Washington.

"The avalanche was beyond all reasonable doubt caused by a thunder storm which happened that night," said Prof. Saunders. "It is a well known fact that atmospheric shocks often start small landslides. A personal acquaintance of mine, who spends much of his time during winter months at Scenic told me of how people in that vicinity were in the habit of starting small slides in the neighborhood by merely firing a gun. At 1:45 on the day before the slide a considerable earthquake was recorded in our seismograph, which would have been just about 12 hours before the catastrophe, but it is not likely that this caused the slide."
