Among other matters that this Council will have to consider are the providing of a suitable place for the handling of cases of contagious diseases; a permanent city pound, the systematizing of the handling of the water system in its financial and mechanical branches, and the enforcement of city ordinances. There are many of the latter on the Ordinance Book, which are practically dead letters, and which if enforced properly, or even partially, would result in much benefit to our city and people.

Now gentlemen I do not wish to detain you longer with this message but desire to say that I sincerely trust that we will have a council this year that will work earnestly and harmoniously, as a unit, for the city's welfare.

I have been a member of the Council for the past four years and I can assure you that the office is no sinecure, it entails a lot of good hard work and I trust that you will all prove good earnest workers. If you cannot give the city your best services you should not have accepted the office. There is ample work for every councilman and if one shirks his duty, it seriously handicaps the rest.

As regards the financial condition of the city, the Treasurer's annual statement, supplemented with some additional information, will be published in due time.

Another matter that should receive the attention of this council, and a very important one, is the general cleanliness of our city. Alleys and yards should be cleaned thoroughly every spring and at such other times as they may require it. This will add greatly to the appearance of the

city and make it more healthful.
