Trial of Fred Wisdom on charge of perjury next on the docket

Evidence was completed and the case argued and given to the jury, which retired shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon to consider the case of Cromwell vs. Lanus, the last of a series of five cases from Union, set for this term of the circuit court.

It is not likely that there will be any more cases from that city until the June term is called, unless something serious enough to warrant a special meeting of the grand jury should occur up that way in the near future.

Railroad Case Today
 Jurors are being selected this afternoon to hear the case of the O. R. & N. against O. F. Coolidge.

This is a well known case involving money alleged to be due the company as a balance on an undercharge for the shipment of these car loads of cement some time ago. It has been heard in court before.

Perjury Case Tomorrow
 If the railroad case now pending can be disposed of before tomorrow morning, which is thought possible, the case of Fred Wisdom of Elgin, charged by the State with perjury will be heard tomorrow.

It seems that Wisdom was shot through the left leg some time ago, and accused one Ira Stewart of Elgin, with having committed the deed. He is charged with having perjured himself at the trial of Stewart in swearing falsely regarding Stewart's guilt.

New York, March 25.—Physicians throughout the city are discussing the possibilities of a serum discovered by Dr. Simon Flexner, which he contends has reduced the mortality at present attending spinal meningitis to a minimum. The doctor claims the serum has cured 107 cases out of 123. The usual mortality from this disease is from 70 to 80 per cent.
