## HEARS OF ACCIDENT

SON DEAD TWO WEEKS BEFORE NEWS REACHES FATHER

Conductor Pencake's son killed in Montana, March 16th

To gain meagre news of the death of his son which occurred two weeks ago at Whitefish, Montana, and to be unable to be appraised either as to the details of an accident which inflicted fatal injuries and to know but the briefest details, is the nerve-racking experience of Conductor Pencake, employed on the Palmer logging train at Palmer Junction.

Last Saturday Mr. Pencake received a belated letter from the East, advising him in the briefest kind of a way of the death of his son O. L. Pencake, at Whitefish, Montana, at which place he was employed as a conductor.

Coming immediately to La Grande from Palmer Junction, Mr. Pencake made a systematic attempt to gain more facts. Western Union wires were kept hot all evening, Saturday, yesterday and this morning again but telegrams sent to railroad officials, officials of the Brotherhood of Conductors and others, failed to bring an answer of any description. Finally this morning, the local O. R. & N. telegraph office received a brief answer from officials at Whitefish. It appears that Mr. Pencake was fatally injured on March 16th, and his brothers, Arthur and Henry were located. The father, Conductor Pencake, of Palmer Junction, was overlooked, however, and no word reached him. It was mere chance that the father heard of it at all.

The message received this morning told in a few words of the fatal injuries, the funeral arrangements, and that was all.

Conductor Pencake is confident that his son Henry, who was at the scene of the accident soon afterwards, had wired to the father, but the message was in some way lost.

How, just when, and other details pertaining to the accident are merely conjectures here. Mr. Pencake returned this morning to his post and has written a letter to Galesburg for all details in connection with the accident.

### BOURNE'S BILL AMENDED.

Homestead bill doctored up considerably by committee.

U. S. Senator Jonathon Bourne, has written the Observer pertaining to the proposed homestead amendment which provided, originally, that applicants need not live on the tract provided they farmed portions of it. The bill has been amended to include the Utah law in this respect, and Mr. Bourne includes the chief paragraph of the bill, which reads as follows:

Sec. 6—That whenever the Secretary of the Interior shall find that any tracts of land, in the States of Oregon or Utah, subject to entry under this act, do not have upon them a sufficient supply of water suitable for domestic purposes as would make residence upon the lands possible, he may, in his discretion, designate such tract of land, not to exceed in the aggregate two million acres, and thereafter they shall be subject to entry under this act without the necessity of residence: PROVIDED, that in event the entryman on any such entry shall in good faith cultivate not less than one-eighth of the entire area of the entry during the second year, one-fourth during the third year and one-half during the fourth and fifth years after the date of such entry, and that after entry and until proof the entryman shall reside within such distance of said land as will enable him to successfully farm the same as required by this section.
