 Atlanta, Ga., April 1.—Atlanta's newest social organization, the Atlanta Club, opens its elaborate quarters today, and is expected to soon take rank as the leading club of the city.

Chicago, April 1.—"All Fools Day" was appropriately observed in Chicago by a change in the street car traffic rules, by which the cars stop at the rear instead of the far corner. The old plan of having the cars stop on the rear corner is not so new one. It was tried here about 115 years ago and was then abandoned in response to prayers of the rear patrons, that they could not learn new habits. It is claimed that the new system will expedite handling of the cars and will prevent congestion during the rush hours.

Election in Spain.
 Madrid, April 1.—General parliamentary elections will be held in Spain this month, and the campaign was commenced amid scenes of much excitement today.

Must Wear Short Hatpins.

Japs Must Register.
 San Francisco, April 1.—All Japanese residents of San Francisco will be required to register at the office of the counsel-general, the ruling becoming effective today. The purpose of the registration is to facilitate the collection of accurate statistics regarding immigration and emigration.

To Save the Seals.

Washington, April 1.—President Taft has taken the lead in a movement to save the seals on the Alaskan islands of St. Paul and of St. George, where the hunting rights granted the North American Commercial company expire today. The company has the privilege of renewing its hunting lease for another 20 years, but the President has asked congress to repeal the contract.

College Aero Convention.

Philadelphia, April 1.—Budding aeronauts from colleges and universities all over the land are in attendance at the first intercollegiate Aeronautical convention at the University of Pennsylvania. Cornell and Columbia joined with the Quakers in arranging for the convention, which is expected to result in the permanent organization of college aeronautics.

Milk and Eggs For Insane.

Albany, N. Y., April 1.—Inmates of State Hospitals for the Insane will hereafter have less smoked meats, hams and shoulders and more eggs and milk for their bill of fare. The State Commission on Lunacy, finding that bids on smoked meats are 40 per cent higher than last year, has decided to change the diet of the State's mad wards during the six months beginning today.

KIDNAPPERS GET RANSOM.

Girl kidnapper last winter to be brought back by relatives.
 Louisville, Ky., April 1.—That eight year old Alma Kellner who was kidnapped last December will be returned to her parents for a ransom of \$10,000 was the statement today of friends of the Kellners. The ransom is said to have been delivered by Fred Fehr, an uncle of the girl and who left several days ago for an appointed place to deliver the money and get the child. No criminal prosecutions will follow.

Rickard on War Path.

San Francisco, April 1.—Jack Gleason, New York.—Don't come back unless you bring Johnson with you. This is final (Signed) Tex Rickard. This message was received in New York by Gleason today. Rickard says he is getting tired of Johnson's antics and the constant scrapes he is getting into are wearing on the Nevada man's nerves. "We have had enough horse play from Johnson," said Tex today, "and it is getting about time for him to get down to serious business."

Club for Tight Wads.

East Orange, N. J., April 1.—Tight wads of the Oranges are flocking to join the new city club, which begins its existence today as the successor to the Orange Club. The popularity of the new club among the no-give-ups is due to the establishment by the house committee of the no-treating rule, which has met with much success in the Westmoreland Club of Pittsburg. This rule is to be relaxed on only one evening of the year, on which occasion the members will be permitted to treat to their hearts content. The dues are \$24 a year, which is \$16 less than those of the Orange Club. The managers say the real purpose of the no-treating rule is not to limit the expenditure of the members for beverages, but rather to preserve a quiet time.
