TAKE CASE TO PENDLETON

Suit brought by receiver in federal court now in session.

Litigation to enforce payment of a \$1000 note held by the Receiver of the defunct Farmers and Traders National Bank against F. C. Bramwell, register of the land office, started in circuit court some time ago when a temporary injunction restraining the government from bringing suit in any other court was issued.

The federal court now sitting at Pendleton. Judge Knowles dissolved the injunction he had previously issued, and Receiver Neldner and counsel Attorney Wm. Ramsey of this city, and a Seattle firm, commenced litigation in the federal court. Today, Mr. Bramwell, Guy E. McCully, Joe Palmer, Walter Neldner and Attorneys John D. Slater and Wm. Ramsey will report before the federal court at Pendleton and perhaps tomorrow argue the matter of jurisdiction. Mr. Bramwell will maintain that the case should come up in the circuit court first.

Should Federal Judge Bean uphold the contentions of Mr. Bramwell's counsel, then the case will be heard before Judge Knowles here in equity, while on the other hand, a denial of that motion will mean that the case will come to trial in law before a federal jury.

Mr. Bramwell alleges as a reason for non-payment of the note that it was given as an accommodation note with no consideration.

Raley, Richards & Raley of Pendleton, and Mr. Slater of La Grande will represent Mr. Bramwell and Attorney Ramsey and a Seattle firm will represent the government.
