Cruiser to Sail Soon.
 Washington, April 3.—The armored cruiser Montana which will lead the special squadron of cruisers to Argentina where they will represent the United States at the centenary celebration May 25th, will sail from Hampton Roads Friday. The vessel will carry Major General Leonard Wood, who will convey the congratulations of the United States to the sister republic. Rear Admiral Stanton is in command of the squadron. The other ships will join at Havana.

Big Sum for Eight of Way
 Undoubtedly the largest sum of money ever paid one man by a railroad company for a right of way across a Umatilla county farm has been paid J. E. Smith by the O. T. & N. company for the right of way desired across his farm in order to straighten out the curves in the present road. The sum for the 40 acres acquired in traveling the three and one half miles of farm was \$75,000. The new route of the road not only passes directly through the Smith alfalfa fields, taking 20 acres of land which he valued at \$500 per acre but it also passes through his orchard, cut his farm up in bad shape and otherwise decreased the value of the place. The Smith farm extends up and down the river for a distance of nearly four miles and is traversed by the road this entire distance.—Piedmont H. O.
