Police believe he is man who terrorized neighborhood for years

Springfield, Mass., April 6.—Ezra ram Spence the police declare has made a full confession that he killed Martha Blackwelder and wounded Daniel Dow in the Dow mansion here on March 31. The police say his confession shows beyond question he was the mysterious bandit who terrorized this section for years. The murder of the Dow residence was one of the most sensational in the history of Springfield.

A small gold locket bearing initials "B. G. S." and containing pictures of Spence's mother and sister, led to his capture. The locket was found in the back yard of a residence that has been robbed. Spence was watched and finally arrested when it was learned that he was present in town. In the room was found two black masks and a revolver, with much loot.
