PHOTOGRAPH COMET
 Lick Observatory gets a good picture of the comet.

Lick Observatory, Calif., April 13—A telephotograph of Halley's comet was secured yesterday when the sky wanderer was approximately 133,000,000 miles distant. The plate was remarkably clear and a fair reproduction was secured.
 The officials are making exhaustive preparations for studying the comet upon nearer approach.

Mrs. Johnston is Commissioner
 John Halley, Jr., who has been United States Commissioner at Pendleton for a number of years, has resigned, his resignation has been accepted and Mrs. Vida Johnston has been appointed to fill the vacancy. Though it did not become known until this morning it seems that Halley had sent in his resignation some time ago and that for the past 2 months the department of justice has been seeking a successor.
 Mrs. Johnston has been the Eastern Oregon deputy clerk for the U. S. courts for several months and has had her office in this city. She received her new appointment this morning and will hold down both positions hereafter. The commission was dated yesterday. She took her oath of office this morning before Frederick Stetler, notary public for Oregon, and is now in office.
 Mrs. Johnston is the only woman holding that office in the United States commissioner in Oregon and is probably the only one the the Northwest.
