GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE

High cost of living subject for jury investigation.

San Francisco, April 15.—A grand jury has been ordered to investigate the cost of food and other necessities of life and the inquiry is expected to be fully under way in a short time. The investigation will be aimed at alleged trusts which are alleged to be operating in violation of the Cartright anti-trust law. Two additional prosecuting attorneys will be appointed to assist.

DEPARTMENT IS SLOW.

The Ballinger investigation drags and Glavis chafes

Washington, April 15.—The attorney for Glavis in the Ballinger hearing today made another protest against the delay of the Interior Department in producing the requested documents. He said he had learned that a number of the papers called for had been sent from Seattle February 8th and these had not been produced. The committee ordered the department to produce the papers immediately.

Resolution.

Be it resolved by the city council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, that the grade of Cove avenue from Jefferson avenue to North Willow street be and the same is hereby established as follows: Commencing at the intersection of Cove avenue with Jefferson avenue at a point 16 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 25 per cent 200 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 4 per cent for 75 feet to a point 12.50 below City base, thence on a grade of 4 per cent for 75 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a level for 175 feet, thence on a grade of 58 per cent for 775 feet to a point 20 feet below City base, at the center of North Cherry street, thence on a grade of 27 per cent for 880 feet to a point 22.40 feet below City base, at the center of North Willow street.

This resolution shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer and after its approval by the Mayor shall be in force and take effect on the 16th day of May, 1910.
