Resolution.

Be it resolved by the city council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, that the grade of Cove avenue from Jefferson avenue to North Willow street be and the same is hereby established as follows: Commencing at the intersection of Cove avenue with Jefferson avenue at a point 15 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 25 per cent 200 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 4 per cent for 75 feet to a point 12.50 below City base, thence on a grade of 4 per cent for 75 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a level for 175 feet, thence on a grade of 58 per cent for 775 feet to a point 20 feet below City base, at the center of North Cherry street, thence on a grade of 27 per cent for 880 feet to a point 22.40 feet below City base, at the center of North Willow street.

This resolution shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer and after its approval by the Mayor shall be in force and take effect on the 15th day of May, 1919.
