"The Man of Galilee"

A packed house greeted Ford A. Ellis last evening as he presented the subject, "The Man of Galilee." The gist of the sermon was as follows: No personage in the last 2500 years has received the supreme love as has the Man of Galilee. Heroes have risen above the average class of their day and won the praise of the people. In time that love dies. As the ages come and go the love for the Galilean increases. Christ won the position not by earthly praise, temporal wealth or society. The religious teachers of his day had no love for him. In viewing the life of the Galilean through the gospels, two classes of the day he condemned, the demons and the teachers of the Jews. He said he wondered if Christ should wander through the streets of La Grande preaching and healing as of old if he would not receive the same condemnation at the hands of the religiousists as he received at the hands of the leaders of the Jewish religion.

QUIT CHURCH FOR POLITICS.

Ephraim pastor finds world of preaching is too tame.

Spokane, April 18.—Charles H. Braden has resigned his pastorate of the Grace Baptist Church to enter politics.

"Politics to some extent expresses life as it really is," said Braden today. "Preachers of the world of ideals are coming to be regarded by a practical world as the embodiment of fanciful theories, excellent to be written about, sung about, theorized about and sometimes cried about, but not to be carried into politics and government and made universally operative."

HIS NEIGHBORS.

One of the agreeable diversions of life is such incidents as happened this week at La Grande, Or. Spring plowing and seeding for L. W. Castle, a farmer of the vicinity, were at a standstill because of the owner's illness. There was a bleak outlook for the immediate future on that farm until one morning a long caravan of 17 neighbors, with teams and farming implements came up the road, opened the gate and drove into the sick man's fields. All day long the teams tugged at their burdens, the visiting farmers bent to their work, doubtless with many a cheery whistle, and in the evening the field, all black from the work of the plows and harrows, was ready for the planting. From his window, the disabled farmer must have watched the movements of the workers, and in his heart and theirs there must have been all day a rhythmic unison eloquent of the sweeter and better nature of man. The sun never shone on a prettier scene and if there is a place on high where they keep a record of good deeds, account will be taken of the incident at La Grande.—Portland Journal.

Resolution.

Be it resolved by the city council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, that the grade of Cove avenue from Jefferson avenue to North Willow street be and the same is hereby established as follows: Commencing at the intersection of Cove avenue with Jefferson avenue at a point 15 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 25 per cent 200 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a grade of 4 per cent for 75 feet to a point 15.5 feet below City base, thence on a level for 175 feet, thence on a grade of 58 per cent for 775 feet to a point 20 feet below City base, at the center of North Cherry street, thence on a grade of 27 per cent for 880 feet to a point 22.40 feet below City base, at the center of North Willow street.

This resolution shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer and after its approval by the Mayor shall be in force and take effect on the 16th day of May, 1910.
