ANOTHER IMPORTANT WITNESS FOR STATE DYING.

Hyde Seems Unusually Favored by Providence in His Trial.

Kansas City, April 23.—"God seems to be displeased at the effort to convict an innocent man of awful crimes on mere suspicions," said Mrs. B. C. Hyde today, when she learned that another witness for the prosecution is near death. R. D. Mitchell, an undertaker, who had charge of the body of Col. Swope, is today seriously ill with typhoid, a malady that has attacked eight members of the Swope household. There seems to be a strange fate following the prosecution. Dr. Twyman, the main witness, died suddenly last week of appendicitis. Two days later the entire outline of the prosecution fell into the hands of the defense. Now comes the serious illness of Mitchell, who was expected to give important testimony.

WOLTERGUILTY SAYS JURY

YOUNGSTER TAKES HIS FATE WITH GOOD CHEER.

Will be Electrocutted for Unmerciful Deed of Not Long Ago.

New York, April 23.—Albert Wolter, the convicted murderer of Ruth Wheeler sits in his cell in the Tombs today joking with his guards, apparently unmoved by the verdict. The guards declare he slept soundly last night.

Wolter will be sentenced Wednesday and taken to Sing Sing to await electrocution.

The murder was an atrocious one. The body of the pretty stenographer was pushed into a chimney place after having been cut to pieces. He lured her to his room under business pretenses and then killed her.

Roscoe West Sinks Excellent Well for Tom Gilkison.

A well 258 feet deep was completed today by Roscoe West of this city for Tom Gilkison of Hot Lake. The water is flowing freely and gives indications of being a splendid supply.

OREGON AND SOUTHEASTERN ROAD UNDER ATTACHMENT

ONE ENGINE AND MAILCAR ALONE ESCAPES STRONG ARM OF THE SHERIFF'S ORDER

Cottage City, Or., April 23.—Rolling stock of the Oregon & Southeastern railroad with the exception of a locomotive and mail car, were attached here today by Sheriff Brown to satisfy a judgment in favor of F. H. Hall and W. B. Foster for damages aggregating \$10,000 for injuries sustained by the men in a wreck a year ago.

Last week the funds of the compa-

ny were attached but only a small sum of money was obtained. The Oregon & Southeastern is 20 miles in length and gives an outlet for the product of nine sawmills along the line. A shipment of logs was brought to a standstill and the sawmills were forced to suspend operations, pending a settlement of the attachment proceedings.

CALL WICKERSHAM TO STAND

Washington, April 23.—Present condition of the administration legislative program, was discussed at the White House today.

Stafford of Wisconsin was another caller and said he hoped to present a postal savings bank bill as soon as the railroad bill is disposed of.

Attorney General Wickersham may be a witness before the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation committee. It is rumored today he will be called as a result of repeated charges by Attorney Brandeis that the Wickersham summary of the Glavis case made to the president contained misstatements of facts.
