WELL KNOWN UNION BANKER I

Succeeds Steel as State Bank Examiner Says Portland Report

Will Wright, of Union county, well known throughout eastern Oregon as a banker of long experience, is to be appointed state bank examiner to succeed James Steel, who is to hand in his resignation to the governor tomorrow.

Mr. Steel resigned to take a place as cashier of the Union Bank and Trust company of Portland, and will take up his new duties May 5.

Mr. Steel spent today at the bank becoming familiar with the duties of his new position. Tomorrow he will go to Salem and clear his desk, ready to turn the state office over to his successor. At the same time he will trun in his resignation to the state board of bank commissioners, consisting of the governor, state treasurer and secretary of state.

Governor Benson said today that he had not been officially notified of Mr. Steel's resignation, and that until the resignation had been received he could not discuss the appointment of a successor.

It is known, however, that some time ago, when Mr. Steel was considering resigning that Mr. Wright was discussed as a probable appointee. From reliable in formation it is now known that Mr. Wright will be appointed as Mr. Steel's successor. Mr. Wright has been cashier of the First National Bank of Union for many years, and only recently resigned.

Mr Whight is a counsin of County Clerk Ed Wright and he has a large acquaintance here who will be delighted to hear of his appointment. For near two decades Mr. Wright has been a prominent figure in Union county's financial affairs.
